For the first time in our lives we dared to open a crack the door that locked us in.



Searching for Signal Lori Cayer

Searching for Signal is a long poem that bears witness to the quotidian, disorienting shifts of grief as a father makes his way toward his death over 3 seasons. This is mourning conducted in situ, the gift of observing one man quietly taking his leave and the impacted hole it leaves behind. The language is mix of narrative lyric and fragmentary breath-spaced verse; the silences are his private silences, alluding to memory, family trauma and shame. The hunter, the gatherer who never stopped trying for epiphanies, a daughter engaged in the same effort, frankly facing the span of a swift human lifetime that may pass without revelation or resolution. If there is redemption it is in the daughter bringing clarity to the physical condition of living and dying and the emotional intricacies of existence.


Theatre is a different world with its own jargon, where fact and fiction merge, lies are delivered as truth, and where people with active imaginations conjure up convincing stories. Who is Roxanne supposed to believe?



Exit Strategies

Meg Todd

The 14 stories in *Exit Strategies* explore the subtleties of memory and storytelling, masterfully creating the universal picture from the quotidian details. These stories do not shy away from difficult truths: a former actuary with a head injury which has robbed her of her mental acuity takes a job caring for a defiant farmer who is facing the decline of his body and his property; an elderly Belgian woman refuses to continue a road trip in BC when her soon-to-be-Canadian son and his dollhouse-obsessed girlfriend stop to help a stranded motorist; an intellectually disabled woman kidnaps three Black children and has the happiest day of her life. This collection gives voice to characters who are not always heard.

She holds her arms tight around herself. "It's freezing."

"She's pretty hot though," Ty says. "That new chick."

"They're charging her," she says. "My mom. For sure they're gonna. The cops. Because they showed up yesterday and were all like..."

"Dude." He loosens the laces of his sneakers. Flicks his lighter, rubs his knuckles up and down his thigh.

"Yeah. Whatever."

"What're you gonna do?" he asks.

"Chick asked me to go to the mall with her. That night. So, she could been at the mall. With me. So. Yeah."

Meg Todd grew up in Calgary and currently lives in Vancouver. She studied Eastern Religious Studies at the University of Calgary and completed her MFA in Creative Writing at UBC. Her work has been published in *Prairie Fire*, *Riddle Fence*, *Grain*, *EVENT*, *The Humber Literary Review*, *The Windsor Review* and *The New Quarterly*. She was a finalist for the CBC short story prize, *Room Magazine*'s fiction contest, *New Letters*' Robert Day Award and *The Puritan*'s Thomas Morton Memorial Prize, and the *CRAFT Literary* Short Fiction Prize.



Losing Shepherd Paul Headrick

Canadian literary star Gordon Bridge is delighted with his celebrity, his family, and his bond with fellow writer Taylor Shepherd. But when Bridge publishes a scathing review of Shepherd's new novel, demonstrating how true critical insight is unswayed by personal loyalty, his hubris destroys the friendship, and his world begins to crumble. Something strange emerges out of Bridge's pain: an old-fashioned sonnet sequence, weirdly modern in content, as it focuses on CBC radio hosts. Its success, driven by every CBC arts show in the country, only deepens Bridge's guilt and accelerates a crippling series of side-effects. Finally, he starts a memoir, a sometimes hilarious, but urgent attempt to come to terms with his past and reshape his present. The result, *Losing Shepherd*, is a testament to literature and also to friendship, its power to lift and its ability to destroy.

"What were you thinking?"


Indeed. I knew, the moment after he asked the question, or I felt the weight of the knowledge—like the weight of a big meal that still needed digesting. It didn't take long after I'd hung up the phone to know exactly—just an hour or so of moving around my study, looking in on the boys and then going back to the study, picking up the book, putting it down. Finally, I flipped through the pages, reading a bit. It was better than Heart City, which was very fine, but still a first novel. Also a step further from An Earlier Encounter (and no, I haven't forgotten that Encounter won the Giller and made the Booker short list).

I had panned a masterpiece.

Such self-deception. I had manufactured flaws that didn't exist, I'd invented subtle literary, even moral, failings, and I'd been so stupidly enthused by my project that I hadn't acknowledged to myself what I was doing.

I held the book in my hands. Stared at it.

I'd been showing off our friendship. Look, everybody. Observe how I can discern the subtle problems to which others will be blind. Behold, oh behold, the strength of our connection, the power of our love, and our respect for literature: enough strength, power, and respect for one to assimilate from the other such cold, public scrutiny. Readers would know that Taylor expected nothing less from me and that my analysis formed the hard stuff of real friendship.

As events unfold next door, Gerry watches from her garden, where she picks rhubarb, weeds, and plants her flowers, catnip and herbs, all supervised by her cats and her friend and part-time housekeeper Prudence. A terrible car crash, an eccentric train engineer (and his equally eccentric wife), and a midnight visit to the house next door all contribute to this cozy mystery coming out all right in the end. And there's jam-making. And ghosts.

Gerry passed her own house—Jay had retreated elsewhere— and decided to paddle a bit longer. She passed Edwina's and sure enough, as Edwina had explained to Prudence, the couple appeared to be entertaining.
