Metropantheon Steven Artelle



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Inspired by eastern myth and theology, the Persian epic, Hindu scripture and other eastern classics, *Metropantheon*, Steven Artelle's gritty, brilliant and wonderfully eccentric debut collection, seeks to inject a bit of spiritual levity into the rat-race void of western urban life. In *Metropantheon* readers find a city teeming with its own unique rituals and mythical beings like graffitichild. Here instances of the divine exist even in the most decayed urban spaces. Poems become prayers for commuting, exalt golds of intersections and skyscrapers, offer origin myths, and create urban culture heroes tailored for the crowded, relentless pace of modern city life. Humorous, dark, racing with the furious heartbeat of a Torontonian commuter, *Metropantheon* captivates long beyond the subway ride to the office.

march remembers nothing of its history but winter in this city of salt ghosts and crying cement amnesia is the season before summer cold like walking through plate glass a marathon of finish lines shattering step after step

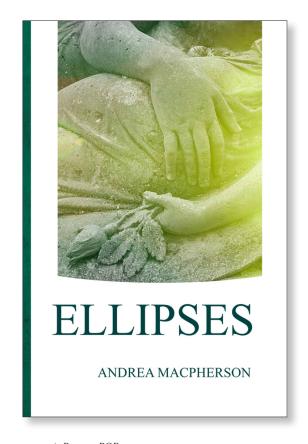
Ellipses

Ellipses was inspired by a trinity of personal events: the deaths of both of Andrea MacPherson's grandmothers and the birth of her daughter. After the deaths of her two grandmothers, Andrea MacPherson came to realize that she did not really know their stories, and would not be able to ask them. In this collection she sets out to tell their stories, reimaging familiar lore to recreate the lives of these two extraordinary women. Ellipses reclaims the often obscured realities of motherhood, illness and the struggles of these women for independence—in verse. This exploration leads to other marginalized voices in history—including Suzanne Valadon and the models who posed for Bellocq—and their stories. The poems in Ellipses are extractions, explorations and, finally, moments of alternate life experiences that are so often left to the ... of historical record.

When the phone rang fumble, quickening of heart (is it possible for that to be hereditary too? Weak heart, heartless, faltering) the words caught. And in that moment I remembered everything about you: cobbled streets and high black heels, your face upturned to Polynesian sun (large, movie-star glasses and pixie cut) smoke songs I did not recognize in the kitchen (sunlight—the back southern window) a tiny glass of Tia Maria, the smudge of your lips and your voice, your voice your voice speaking to your mother again.

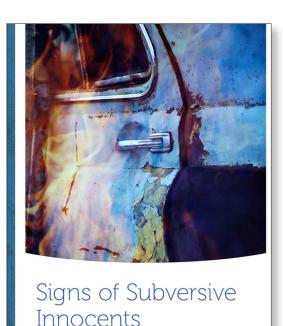

« ABOUT THE BOOK »

Signs of Subversive Innocents travels the depth of human experience from the celebratory to the delusional. This debut collection by Cora Siré tells of characters and realms, both distant and familiar, with vibrant intensity and lyricism. The poems speak of physical and metaphorical signs—omens, gestures, creations and other markings or traces of human existence—and the impulse to subvert destiny, the tension between actuality and desire that underlies beauty, terror, desperation and triumph. Uniquely structured around a quartet set in an abandoned marble quarry, the poems resonate for their ingenuity and range while evoking the search for connection in a complex world.

I'm walking to the relic on display a rusting blue car driven by the monk who set himself on fire in '63. Tomorrow's my last day in this city devoted to its poets, their verses woven into conical hats that shield the scars of mines and agent orange. I follow the bleached path back to the piers to board a blue and yellow dragon boat as sunset streaks the Perfume River sky. The boatman steers through swirling currents then cuts the motor to save gas. We float with purpose, direction, but in no rush. He docks, I rise to disembark and pay. Ten thousand sorrows map the boatman's eyes. "Please visit Thúy," he says, "before leaving Hué."

What does it mean to leave the country—and the people—you love? To be uprooted from the soil that gave birth to, and nurtured you? To abandon both your past and your hoped-for future and embark on a voyage of uncertainty? In *Refugee Song*, Lawrence Feuchtwanger weaves together fragmented memories of his South African childhood, youth, and self-exile, with the stories of others—refugees, the displaced and dispossessed, voyagers—who were forced, or chose to leave their homes; his Jewish forebears, Africa's colonized and colonizers, heroic and tragic characters from Greek mythology.

I see now, that although history has unfolded without me, the ever-receding past remains ever-present, graffiti ghosting through insoluble lines, redacted truths, visible only to the naked.

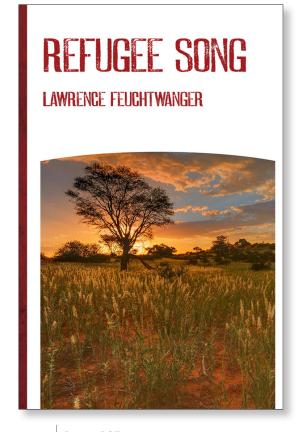
So, when I say my country, I no longer know what I mean, or even what I mean to say.

Do I mean the endless stretch and certainty of a cloudless low veld sky, marching rows of mielies dropping their tassled heads to pray for rain?

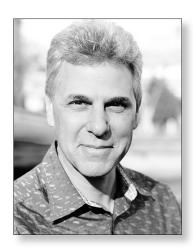
Or, do I mean this rip in the evergreen, heaven's tears pouring through, day and night, granting cedar its rough promise, salmon its blind leap?

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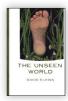

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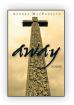
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
